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## INTRODUCTION

### Down The Memory Lane

Kampur College of Nagaon district is a propitious institution offering Arts courses under Gauhati University for degree programme. The college is situated in Kampur town, the southern part of Nagaon District, with the river Kapili flowing nearby. Kampur is located at 26.20 N 92.63 E and it has a population of 2,23,815 (Census Report, 2013). According to Census of India, 2011 report the literary rate of Kampur town is 88.28%, which is higher than state average of 72.19%. Kampur College has played a major role behind this significant percentage of high literary rate of Kampur and the nearby area. This college is at a distance of 30 Km from Nagaon bypass of the East West Corridor and is well connected by routes. The nearest railway station to this college is Kampur station, which lies at a distance of less than one kilometre.

In the early sixties, a group of post graduates from Kampur area dreamt of a college in Kampur. These youths, namely Hira Barthakur, Sabharam Mazumdar, Gahit Chandra Saikia, Soru Ram Laskar, Juga Bora and Magu Bordoloi discussed about this with their friends and teachers residing in the hostel of Kampur H.S. & M.P. School. These teachers including Sri Chittaranjan Sarmah Roy, Netrahash Goswami, Bilin Dutta and Uma Kalita not only welcomed the youths' admirable endeavor but also promised to support them in attaining their target.

In their quest for a mentor the public-spirited youths fortunately found the most valuable guidance from the then principal of ADP College late Md. Abdul Hye. According to his esteemed suggestion, a coaching class consisting of female students was started from July, 1967, with an arrangement that they would appear in P.U. Final Examination of 1968 through ADP College, Nagaon. Meanwhile, a committee to supervise the functioning of the coaching classes was formed with Sri Juga Prasad Bora and Sri Hira Barthakur as the president and secretary respectively while Sri Rudra Borah, Upen Bayan, Saruram Laskar, Magu Bardoloi, Kalyan Chakraborty, Chittaranjan Sarmah Roy, Bishwa Borah, Gahit Chandra Saikia, Sabharam Mazumdar and Uma Kalita as its members.

The commencement of the coaching classes was the crucial juncture leading to all subsequent activities taking place in quick succession. Those in management were constantly at work trying to fulfil pre-conditions that would pave the way for the college to be born. To the satisfaction of all concerned, the Executive Council of Gauhati University accorded the much awaited permission to start the formal college with Pre-University (Arts) Classes from the session 1968-69 and with this Kampur College came into existence.

After getting the permission from the university, the coaching classes ceased to exist and regular P.U. classes for the session 1968-69 were held in Swaraj Bhavan, a public hall at the heart of the town. Sri Krishnananda Sarmah Barua, M.A. (English) was appointed the principal on 15th July, 1968 and he remained in that post till his retirement on 28th February, 1996. The tireless efforts of the Managing Committee was paid back well when the college was allotted 40 bighas of land out of the grazing reserve lying to the west of Kampur. Immediately after that, the foundation stone of the college building was laid on 20th March 1969 by Dev Kanta Baruah, the then Oil Chairman.

To construct the college building on its allotted land a massive fund collection drive was undertaken during 1969-70 in Kampur and its nearby areas. In an unprecedented way, the local people responded spontaneously with their contributions to the collection campaign. With the money thus collected, the Building Construction Committee, under the guidance of the Secretary of the committee Sri Lakheswar Gohain undertook construction works very soon. Eventually, a tin-roofed concrete institution emerged on the college land and the classes were shifted to it in the beginning of the new session of 1970. Then in 1973, the Managing Committee was replaced by College Governing Body, constituted by the govt. of Assam. The president of the first GB was Punaram Borah and



Jageswar Borah was its secretary. As there was no govt. grant forthcoming, the fund position had to be revitalized from time to time with the donation and fund collected through the theatre and cinema shows organised in aid of the college. Still, the sources to meet various requirements remained limited. In the meantime, the college was granted affiliation up to BA 1st year in 1975. Another important occurrence took place in July 1976 when the college received an ad-hoc grant of Rs. 1000 per month and it was enhanced to Rs. 3000 in 1977. However, after eleven long years, all heaved a sigh of relief when in July 1979 the college was brought under deficit grant-in-aid system.

Kampur College has already completed 55 years of its existence and, within this period the College has made relatively slow but noticeable progress. At present, the college imparts undergraduate level of education with facilities for Major courses in Assamese, Economics, Education, English, Geography, History and Political Science. The college has been assessed and accredited by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) with C++ Grade in 2005. The college has been registered under section 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act.

### Our College Values

Kampur college is well equipped with modern infrastructural facilities and well-endowed with an excellent and dedicated faculty to cater to the needs and aspirations of the students to meet the challenges of the present day competitive world. There exists an atmosphere of cordial relationship between the students and teachers in the college. Apart from academic pursuits, stress is also put on co-curricular activities and all round development of the students' personality. Special attention is paid to the students coming from backward and marginalised sections of society whose welfare was on the top of the agenda when the college was established.

Kampur College has certainly grown in stature over the years and is counted as one of the leading co-educational institutions of Nagaon district. Since its establishment, the college has come a long way in meeting the emerging needs and challenges of the present day scenario.

### Vision of the College

- To empower economically and socially backward people through quality and value based education
- To serve the needs of society in general and downtrodden classes in particular- imparting knowledge and developing skills and attitudes: to inculcate in them values of life to emerge as useful citizens and fully developed individuals.

### Mission of the College

- To build high standard of excellence in the preservation and creation of knowledge through teaching, learning and experiment.
- To serve as an effective instrument of development in the path of education, progress and total awakening of the rural people.
- To remove the backwardness of the entire southern part of Nagaon District of Assam.



## NEW EDUCATION POLICY AND FYUGP

The New Education Policy 2020 brings a monumental change in the domain of academia across the nation. The policy is replacing 3-year degree course with a liberal four year under graduate programme (FYUGP). The New Education Policy (NEP) 2020 recognizes that higher education plays an extremely important role in promoting human as well as societal well-being. The policy also endeavours developing India as envisioned in its Constitution – a democratic, just, socially conscious, cultured, and humane nation upholding liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all. NEP 2020 notes that “given the 21st-century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals”.

The Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) under Gauhati University is based on the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The FYUGP is designed to cater to the diverse academic needs of the student and seeks to offer options of multiple entries / exits and obtain a Certificate or a Diploma or Degree with or without Major or a Degree (Honours) or a Degree (Honours) with Research at various levels as stipulated under the policy.

### Objectives

The aims and objectives of the FYUGP under NEP 2020 are to highlight certain fundamental principles that would guide both the education system at large, as well as individual educational institutions. These objectives, as stated below, have a direct bearing on the curricula for different levels of higher education:

1. First of all, the policy endeavours to recognize, identify, and foster the unique capabilities of each student to promote her / his holistic development.
2. It also attempts to providing flexibility so that learners can select their learning trajectories and programmes, and thereby choose their own paths in life according to their talents and interests.
3. The policy promises to provide multidisciplinary and holistic education across the sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities, and sports for a multidisciplinary world.
4. It emphasizes on conceptual understanding rather than rote learning. The policy also attempts to build critical thinking and encourages logical decision-making and innovation on the part of the learners.
5. The policy upholds ethics, human & constitutional values and emphasizes on building life-skills such as communication, teamwork, leadership, and resilience.
6. The policy also emphasizes on extensive use of technology in teaching and learning, removing language barriers, increasing access for Divyang students, and educational planning and management.
7. The policy endeavours to ensure respect for diversity and respect for the local context in all curricula, pedagogy, and policy.

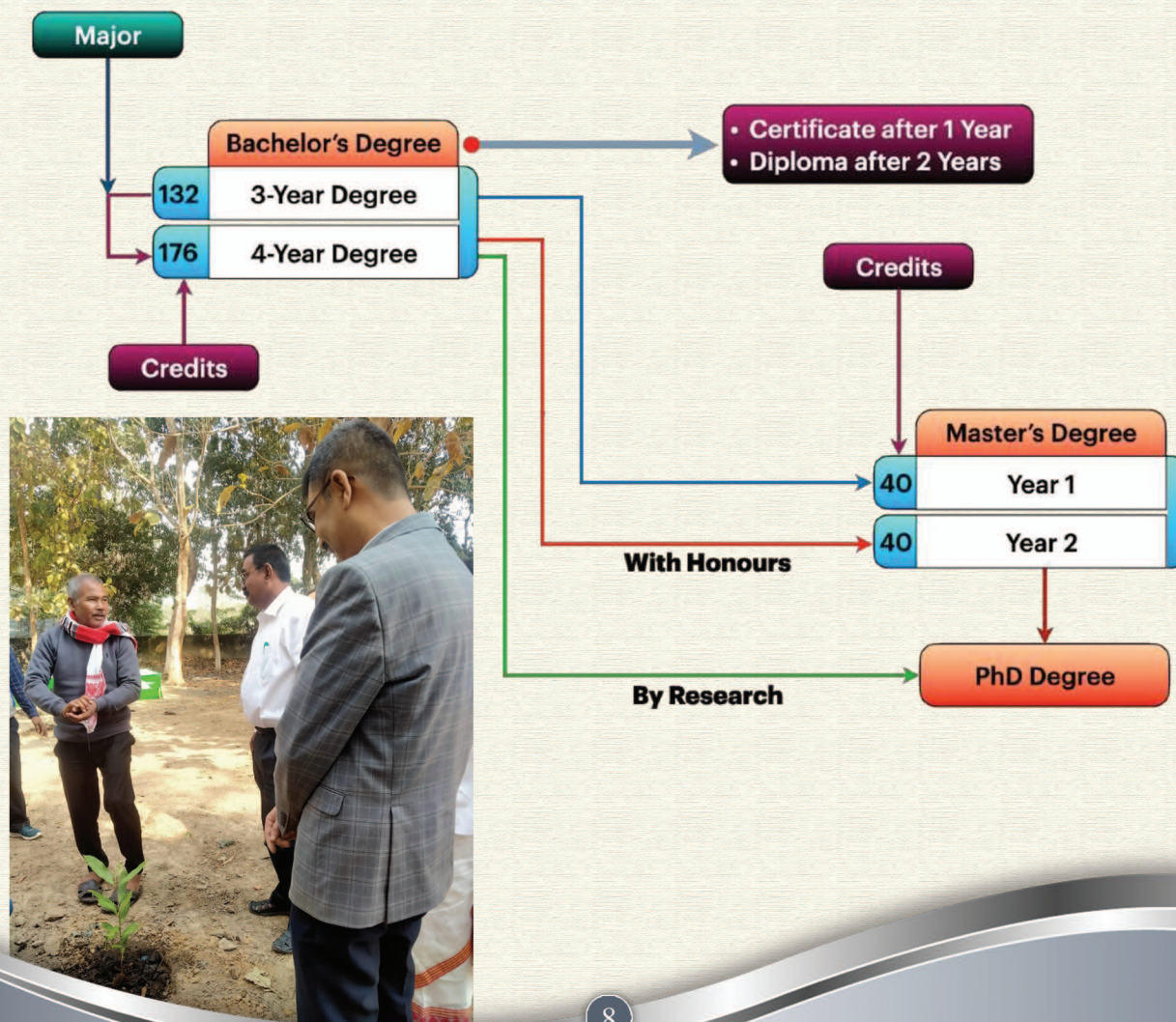




### SAILENT FEATURES OF FYUGP

- Flexibility to move from discipline of study to another.
- Opportunities for learners to choose the course of their interest in all discipline.
- Facilitating multiple entry and exit options with UG certificate/ UG Diploma/ or degree depending upon the number of credits secured.
- Every student who wants to exit before 3 years into the programme, MUST complete an additional Vocational Course of 4 credit.
- Flexibility for learners to move from one institution to another to enable them to have multi and /or interdisciplinary learning.
- Flexibility to switch to alternative modes of learning (offline, ODL, and Online learning, and hybrid modes of learning.)
- Here one can take double major utilizing free credits.
- After completion of four years with Honours/Research, one can go for one year Master Course or PhD/Research Programme directly.

## STRUCTURE OF MAJOR AND MINOR UNDER FYUGP

Under FYUGP a student can opt one of the following three options to complete a Degree Program

1. The student can choose a Major course and two Minor courses. With this option, the student will have 12 free credits, which she/he can utilise if she/he wants to.
2. In the second option, which is a major and 3 minors, the student has utilised these 12 free credits to complete one more Minor.
3. The third option is when the student do not want any Major but wants to study all three courses equally. This option will be known as No Major (NOM) option. In this option, the students study one paper from each of the three subjects in each semester from Semester 1 to 6. However, She/he will need to complete 12 more credits, which she/ he can do by studying three courses (papers) from any of the three core subjects

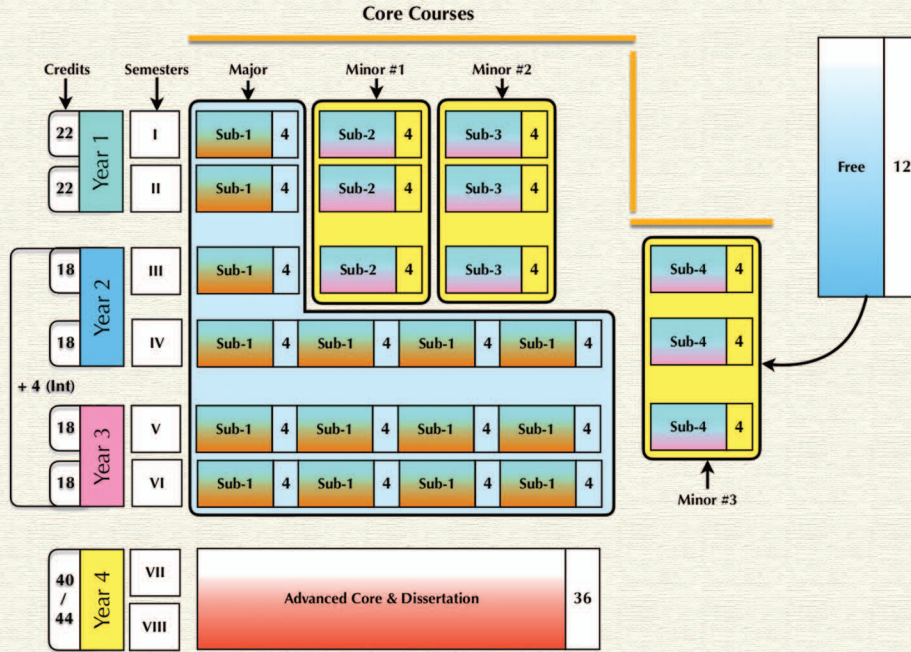

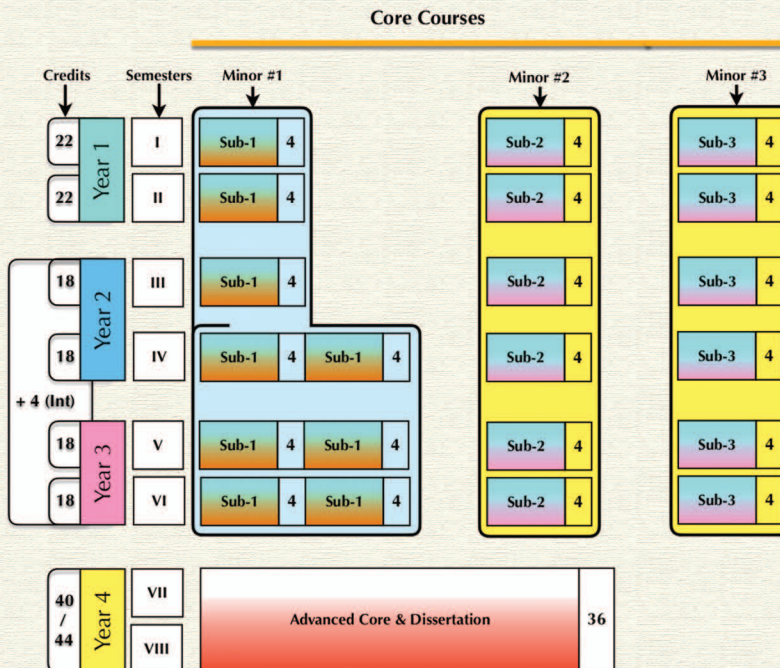

6. Bachelor Degree in Arts with Major/Honours in Hindi
7. Bachelor Degree in Arts with Major/Honours in History
8. Bachelor Degree in Arts with Major/Honours in Political Science

### COURSES OF STUDY

Keeping in mind the FYUGP structure of Gauhati University the college broadly offers total 10 subjects. Out of these, 8 subjects can be taken as both Major/Minor and 2 as only Minors under Core Course category. From Common course category a student has to select one Multidisciplinary course, one Value Added Course (VAC) and one Ability Enhancement Course (AEC). In the second semester, instead of Value Added Course (VAC), students need to study a Skill Enhancement Course (SEC).

The following table includes all the subjects that a student of this college can choose as Core and Common Courses in the first semester of Degree Course.

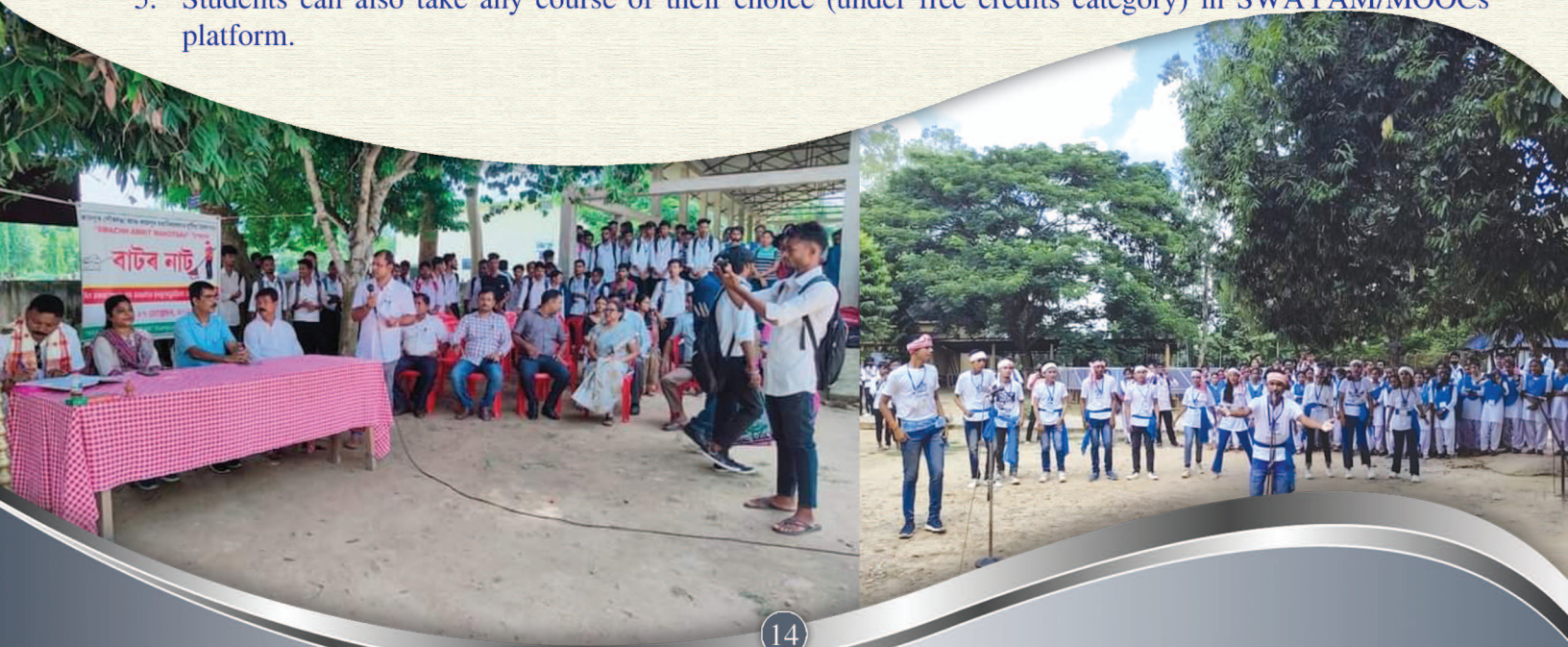

### POINTS TO REMEMBER

1. A student can take admission as ‘Degree with only minors’ (Earlier it was called Pass Course or Regular) and now he/she has to select three subjects as per their interest.
2. One can change their major subject at the beginning of Fourth semester. Even the students studied without major can select a subject as Major course in the fourth semester. (Condition of seat capacity is applied)
3. Notably, as the subjects Education and Geography have practical, so one can opt either one.
4. A student can’t choose a multidisciplinary paper from those subjects already studied in their Higher Secondary level.
5. Students can also take any course of their choice (under free credits category) in SWAYAM/MOOCs platform.

## ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Admission to BA course is open to the applicants who have passed the Higher Secondary examination in Arts under AHSEC or any other equivalent examination recognized by Gauhati University.

- The dates of admission to various courses will be notified in the college notice board and website.
- Admission to the college is made strictly in order of merit and government laid rules of reservation.

### Steps for Admission

#### Step 1

• One must have to register in Digilocker (Ministry of Education, Government of India). For Digilocker, students must have AADHAR card.

• He/She must have Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) account. ABC is a virtual academic mechanism to facilitate the academic mobility of students between Educational institutions across the country. All students must obtain ABC ID through Digilocker platform before admission.

#### Step 2

A student must get ABC ID first and then go for online admission through college website [www.kampurcollege.ac.in](http://www.kampurcollege.ac.in)

- A student can go for online form fill up through Samarth Portal ([kampurcollege.ac.in](http://kampurcollege.ac.in)).
- Students need to submit the hardcopy of form as well as photocopy of other documents i.e. HSLC Admit, HS Mark sheet, HS Certificate, Caste Certificate, Income Certificate etc.
- After selection of candidates, student can deposit their fee.

#### Step 3

• After admission in the College, one must register under Gauhati University through Digilocker /ABC account ID.

- Thereafter he/ she should choose their papers/ options.
- There will be a window of short duration to correct/confirm the programme/ papers.
- No one can change their papers at the mid of the semester.

- IF ANY FALSE ATTESTATION/FALSIFIED RECORDS ARE DETECTED, THE STUDENT WILL BE DEBARRED FROM ATTENDING ANY COURSES.

### Reservation

Seats for SC, ST and OBC students are reserved as per govt rules. In this respect caste certificate issued by the competent authority under Government of Assam only will be valid.





## GENERAL INFORMATION

Classes for newly admitted students of BA 1st semester for the session 2023-24 will start according to the latest Academic Calendar of Gauhati University.

The college class hours are from 9.30 am to 4.30 pm.

### (A) Rules and Regulations of the College

#### (i) College Rule and Discipline

In our college emphasis is laid on discipline and character building. Students are required to maintain high standard of discipline in and outside of the college campus. They are also expected to obey rules and regulations of the college prescribed by the college authority. Violation of rules and regulations will lead to disciplinary action like termination of scholarship and expulsion from the college. In this regard the decision of the Principal is final.

- ✎ The college premise is a NO SMOKING ZONE. Smoking and any other kind of intoxicants including panmachala, gutkha and spitting in the classrooms are strictly prohibited.
- ✎ Gossiping and loitering either in the verandahs or in the class rooms are strictly prohibited when classes or examinations are going on.
- ✎ Property of the college is the property of all. Damage of any property will lead to severe punishment
- ✎ Irregularities, misbehaviour, violence of any kind and disobedience towards the teachers or authority by any students are punishable.
- ✎ College uniform is compulsory for all students
- ✎ 75% class attendance is mandatory to appear in the final examinations.

#### (ii) Undertaking by the Parent/ guardian

The parent/ guardian of the student will have to give an undertaking in the prescribed form at the time of submission of admission form in the college to the effect that his/her ward will maintain discipline and decorum of the college. In this form itself the parent/guardian will also have to give an undertaking mentioning their annual income.

#### (iii) Students' Class Attendance

The college takes students' class attendance into account for the purpose of allowing students for appearing in the Semester system, receiving academic awards and scholarships, participating in the students' union election etc. The college has the following rules in this regard,

20% of the marks allotted for Internal Assessment will be awarded to the students based on class attendance. If the total marks for Internal Assessment is 20, then 4 marks will be awarded to the students based on class attendance. The following criteria will be adopted for awarding marks under this category:

- A) Class attendance from 76% to 80%.....1 mark
- B) Class attendance from 81% to 85%.....2 marks
- C) Class attendance from 86% to 90%.....3 marks
- D) Class attendance from 91% and above.....4 marks



- A student whose attendance is more than 65% and less than 75% will have to pay Non-collegiate fees to appear in any final examination conducted by GU.
- A student whose attendance is found to be less than 65% will be considered as Dis-collegiate and such student will be debarred from appearing in any final examination conducted by GU.
- Continued absence of 25 days in class is enough to prohibit the concerned students from attending classes.
- Scholarship holders with less than 75% of attendance will have to return the entire amount to the concerned authority.
- Students who remain absent to represent college in NCC, NSS and extracurricular activities in University/State/National/International level meets will have to compensate his/her loss through extra classes and Sessional Examination with the consent of the respective teachers.

#### (iv) College Uniform

College Uniform is compulsory for all students. No student is permitted to wear any dress other than the college uniform in the college premises.

**Boys:** white shirt, black coloured trouser

**Girls:** Muga or Muga coloured mekhela, white chaddar with blue border and blue blouse/white coloured Salwar kamij with blue coloured churni. Leggings are strictly prohibited.

**Sweater:** In winter, black sweater for boys and black Cardigan for girls.

**COLLEGE UNIFORM IS COMPULSORY FOR ALL STUDENTS AND NO OTHER DRESS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE COLLEGE PREMISES.**

#### (v) Identity card

The college authority issues an identity card at the time of admission to every student. This card is non-transferable. It contains vital information about the holder viz, name, semester, class, roll no and a passport size photograph duly attested and signed by the principal. It is mandatory for a student to keep the identity card during his/her college hours.

#### (vi) Teacher- Guardian meet

The teacher guardian meetings are held regularly in the college keeping in view the academic schedule.



## (B) Facilities Provided in the College

### (i) College library and reading room

The college has a well-organized library processing for automation with an integrated Library Management Software accommodated with a good stock of text books, reference books and other recreational books. A large number of journals, magazines and periodicals including Newspapers are also stocked in the library with a spacious reading room for creating reading environment for the students. After admission students are provided with library cards to issue books. Students are issued two books for pass course and four books for honours courses. Borrowers must return the books within ten days from the date of issue of the books. An overdue of charge of Rs 1/- per book per day, will be levied if the book is not returned on or before the due date. However, there is provision of re-issue and reservation of books. A borrower will be responsible for the loss or damage of any book borrowed from the college library. Students are asked to submit all the issued books before their final examinations for getting clearance from the library for the issue of admit cards.

### (ii) Departmental Library

Each department of Kampur College has a departmental library with the facility of providing books to the interested students. These libraries have journals, reference books etc. which is of great help particularly to the students opting Major/Honours.

### (iii) Photocopy and print out

The college has provision of photocopy and printing at a nominal price.

### (iv) Digital Classroom

Kampur College has the facility of Digital classroom with digital board install in it.

### (v) Internet facility

Wi-fi connected free internet facility is available in the college campus which is a step forward digital literacy.

### (vi) Internet browsing point

The college has a provision of internet browsing point for students and teachers.

### (vii) Mentor and Mentee System

There is student mentoring system in the college. It bridges the gap between faculties and students. All the teachers of the college are involved in the process of mentoring. Every mentor prepares a list of all the students allotted to him/her with details of name, class, division, roll no., contact number and e mail id. The mentor teacher takes care of all the mentees by providing them career counselling as well as personal counselling. A mentee can approach his /her mentor for both educational and personal guidance. It helps the students to strengthen their capabilities. The Mentor Mentee list for this session will be published later.



### **(viii) Scholarship**

The college has a canteen which provides food to the students, faculty and employees of the college at a reasonable price.

### **(xi) Indoor stadium**

The college provides facilities for outdoor and indoor games. There is a well- equipped indoor stadium and gymnasium in the college campus.

The SC/ST/OBC and minority students can avail the remedial classes as per the UGC scheme.

There is a provision of students' participation in the youth festival organised by GU and different inter college competitions every year.

## **RULES AND REGULATIONS ON ANTI-RAGGING**

### **1. Aim :**

To root out ragging in all its forms from the institution, stringent anti-ragging measures and provisions for strict punishments to defaulters.

#### **i) Terms of Reference :**

- (a) Supreme Court Orders
- (b) UGC Draft Regulations and Guidelines

### **2. What constitutes Ragging:**

(a) Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student.

(b) Indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological or physical harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student.

(c) Asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.

(d) Teasing, embarrassing, humiliating, assaulting or using criminal force or criminal intimidation, wrongful restraining or confining or causing grievous hurt, kidnapping, extortion or molesting or committing unnatural offences or causing death or abetting suicide, use of criminal force, criminal trespass and intimidation.

### **3. Prohibition of Ragging :**

(a) Ragging within the institutions/ departments is strictly prohibited.

(b) Ragging in any form is prohibited also in the private lodges/buildings where these college students are staying.

(c) No person including students / staff / faculty shall participate or abet or propagate ragging in any form. No person shall practise ragging in any form, within or outside the premises of the college. Any person who contravenes the provision listed above shall, on conviction, be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to 3 years or with fine which may extend to fifty thousand rupees or with both.

### **4. Roles and Responsibilities :**

Any incidence of matters related to ragging may immediately report it to the anti-ragging squad, the principal or the "Officer-in-Charge. The identity of the complainant will be kept confidential. In all cases a First Information Report (FIR) will be filed without exception by the college authorities with the local Police authority. Whenever any student or, as the case may be, the parents or guardian or a teacher, the non-teaching staff or an Officer-in-Charge makes a complaint, in writing, of ragging to the principal, the principal shall, without prejudice to the foregoing provisions, enquire into it and, if, prima facie, it is found true, suspend the student found guilty.

### 5. Formation of committee :

To assist authorities in curbing the menace of ragging, an anti -ragging squad has been formed in the college consisting of the following members-

The students can download the “Anti-ragging mobile app” from the play store too for easy access.

### Anti-Ragging Affidavit:

It is mandatory for every student and his/her parents to submit an anti-ragging affidavit at the time of first admission and there after each year at the time of annual registration.

### FOR YOUR ATTENTION
