INTRODUCTION

Chronicles of Growth

Kampur College, located in the Nagaon district, is a promising institution offering undergraduate programmes in Arts under Gauhati University. The college is situated in Kampur town in the southern part of the district, in a serene setting near the Kapili River, which enhances its academic environment. Kampur is geographically positioned at 26.20 N latitude and 92.63 E longitude and has a population of approximately 2,23,815 (Census Report, 2013). According to the Census of India 2011, Kampur town has a literacy rate of 88.28%, significantly higher than the state average of 72.19%. Kampur College has played a pivotal role in achieving and sustaining this high literacy rate in the region and its surrounding areas.

The college is well-connected by road and is located about 30 km from the Nagaon bypass of the East-West Corridor. The nearest railway station, Kampur Railway Station, lies at a distance of less than one kilometre, ensuring convenient accessibility for students and faculty.

In the early 1960s, a visionary group of postgraduate youths from the Kampur region conceived the idea of establishing a college in the area. Among them were Hira Barthakur, Sabharam Mazumdar, Gahit Chandra Saikia, Soru Ram Laskar, Juga Bora, and Magu Bordoloi. They discussed this aspiration with their peers and teachers residing in the hostel of Kampur H.S. & M.P. School. The teachers—Sri Chittaranjan Sarmah Roy, Netrahash Goswami, Bilin Dutta, and Uma Kalita—not only appreciated the earnest efforts of these young visionaries but also extended their wholehearted support in realizing this noble objective.

In their search for guidance, these public-spirited youths were fortunate to receive valuable mentorship from the then Principal of A.D.P. College, the late Md. Abdul Hye. Acting on his advice, a coaching programme for female students was initiated in July 1967, with the arrangement that they would appear for the Pre-University Final Examination of 1968 under A.D.P. College, Nagaon. To oversee this initiative, a committee was constituted with Sri Juga Prasad Bora as President and Sri Hira Barthakur as Secretary, supported by members including Sri Rudra Borah, Upen Bayan, Saruram Laskar, Magu Bordoloi, Kalyan Chakraborty, Chittaranjan Sarmah Roy, Bishwa Borah, Gahit Chandra Saikia, Sabharam Mazumdar, and Uma Kalita.

The initiation of these coaching classes marked a significant turning point, setting in motion a series of developments that would eventually lead to the establishment of the college. The management worked diligently to fulfil the necessary conditions required for formal recognition. Their sustained efforts were rewarded when the Executive Council of Gauhati University granted permission to commence Pre-University (Arts) classes from the academic session 1968–69. Thus, Kampur College formally came into existence.

Following this approval, the coaching classes were discontinued, and regular Pre-University classes for the 1968–69 session were conducted at Swaraj Bhavan, a public hall located in the heart of Kampur town. Sri Krishnananda Sarmah Barua, M.A. (English), was appointed as the first Principal on 15 July 1968 and served the institution with distinction until his retirement on 28 February 1996. The tireless efforts of the Managing Committee bore fruit when the college was allotted 40 bighas of land from the grazing reserve situated to the west of Kampur. Subsequently, the foundation stone of the college building was laid on 20 March 1969 by Dev Kanta Baruah, then Chairman of Oil India, marking a historic milestone in the growth of the institution.

To facilitate the construction of the college building on its allotted land, an extensive fund-raising drive was undertaken during 1969–70 in Kampur and its surrounding areas. The initiative witnessed an overwhelming and spontaneous response from the local community contributing generously to the cause. With the funds thus collected, the Building Construction Committee, under the guidance of its Secretary, Sri Lakheswar Gohain, promptly initiated construction work. As a result, a tin-roofed concrete structure was erected on the college premises, and classes were shifted to the new building at the beginning of the academic session in 1970.

In 1973, the Managing Committee was replaced by a duly constituted Governing Body formed by the Government of Assam. The first Governing Body was headed by Sri Punaram Borah as President and Sri Jageswar Borah as Secretary. In the absence of adequate government grants during the early years, the institution had to rely on public donations and funds raised through cultural activities such as theatre and cinema shows. Despite these efforts, financial resources remained limited, posing challenges to the institution's growth.

The college achieved a significant milestone in 1975 when it received affiliation up to the B.A. First Year. Further progress was marked in July 1976 with the sanction of an ad hoc government grant of 1,000 per month, which was subsequently increased to 3,000 in 1977. A major breakthrough came in July 1979, when the college was brought under the deficit grant-in-aid system, providing much-needed financial stability.

Having completed over five decades of its existence, Kampur College has made steady and commendable progress. At present, the college offers undergraduate programmes with Major courses in Assamese, Economics, Education, English, Geography, Hindi, History, and Political Science. The institution has been assessed and accredited by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) with a B grade in 2023. It is also recognized under Sections 2(f) and 12(b) of the University Grants Commission (UGC) Act.



Our College Values

Kampur college is well equipped with modern infrastructural facilities and well-endowed with an excellent and dedicated faculty to cater to the needs and aspirations of the students to meet the challenges of the present day competitive world. There exists an atmosphere of cordial relationship between the students and teachers in the college. Apart from academic pursuits, stress is also put on co-curricular activities and all round development of the students' personality. Special attention is paid to the students coming from backward and marginalised sections of society whose welfare was on the top of the agenda when the college was established.

Kampur College has certainly grown in stature over the years and is counted as one of the leading co-educational institutions of Nagaon district. Since its establishment, the college has come a long way in meeting the emerging needs and challenges of the present day scenario.

A brief introduction about NEP and FYUGP

The National Education Policy 2020 marks a transformative shift in the landscape of higher education across the nation. One of its key initiatives is the transition from the traditional three-year degree structure to a more flexible and holistic Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP). The policy underscores the pivotal role of higher education in fostering both individual growth and societal well-being.

Aligned with the ideals enshrined in the Constitution of India, NEP 2020 aspires to shape a democratic, equitable, and culturally enriched society grounded in the values of liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice. It envisions an education system that nurtures socially responsible, ethical, and well-rounded individuals. Emphasizing the demands of the 21st century, the policy advocates for quality higher education that cultivates critical thinking, creativity, and holistic development, thereby preparing learners to contribute meaningfully to society.

Brief Overview of FYUGP (Gauhati University)

The Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) under Gauhati University is implemented in alignment with the National Education Policy 2020. Designed to address the diverse academic needs of students, the programme offers a flexible and holistic 4-year undergraduate programme that allows multiple entry and exit options:

After 1 year Certificate

After 2 years Diploma

After 3 years Bachelor's Degree(with or without major)

After 4 years Bachelor's Degree with Honours

Students can exit and later re-enter the programme, but it must be completed within 7 years.

Honours and Major

After 3 years: Students can earn a Bachelor's Degree with/without a Major

After 4 years: Students can earn a Bachelor's Degree with Major and Honours

Progression

Students exiting after 3 years can apply for the 1st year of a Master's programme (2-year course).

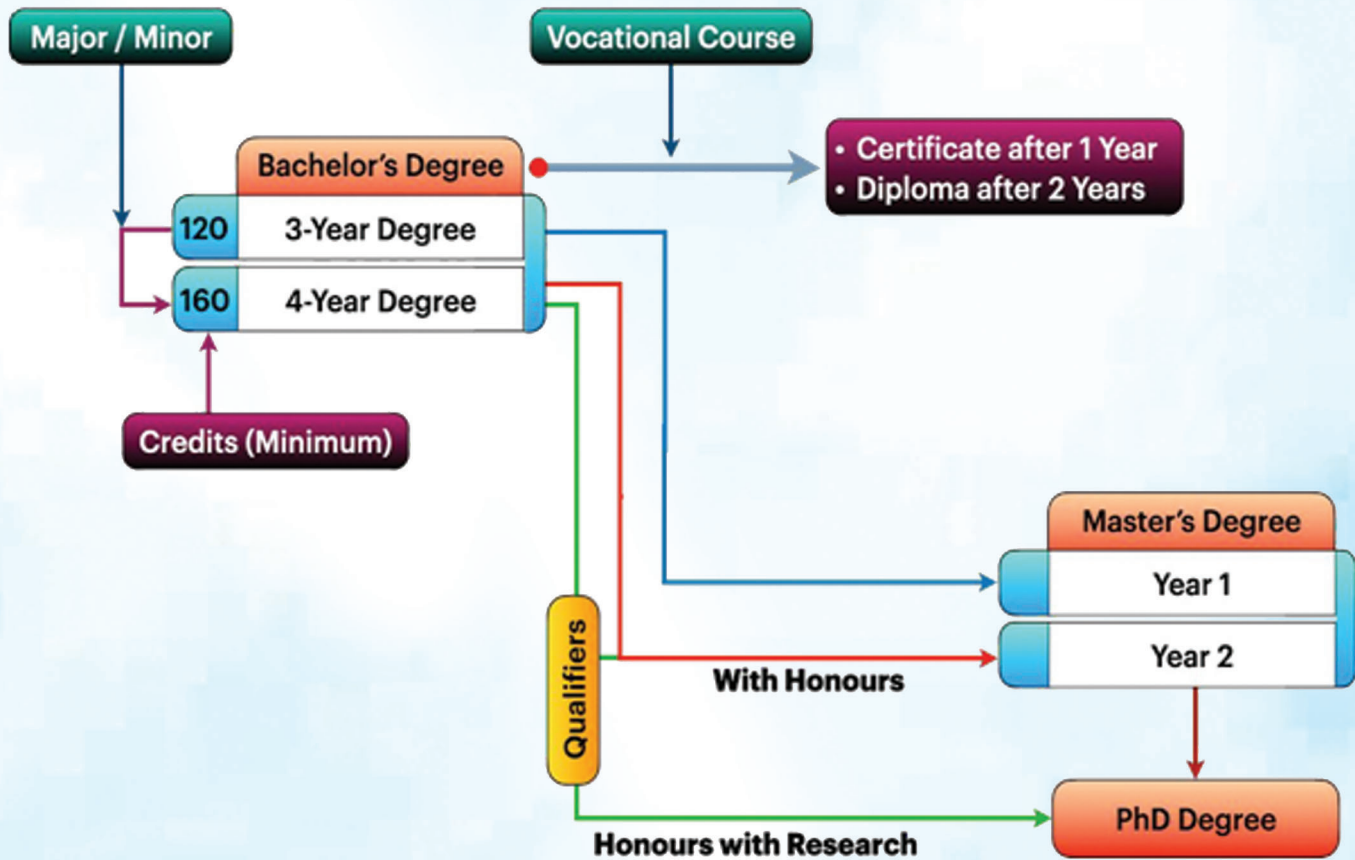
Students completing the 4-year Honours degree can directly enter the 2nd year of a Master's programme, needing only 1 additional year to complete it.

Progression to Doctoral Programme

After completing a Bachelor's degree (3 or 4 years) and enrolling in a Master's programme, students become eligible for PhD admission.

Exceptionally talented students may skip the Master's and apply directly to a Doctoral programme after completing FYUGP.

PROGRAM OFFERED

Under the FYUGP, students may be awarded two types of Bachelor's degrees upon successful completion of the programme:

1. Bachelor's Degree in a Stream
2. Bachelor's Degree in a Discipline

Degree in Stream (Arts)

1. The student can choose one Major subject and one Minor subject in Arts.
2. In the second option, which is degree without Major, the student can choose two subjects as minor subjects.
3. Another option is degree with double major. In this option, a student may utilise all the free credits choosing another Minor with total credit of 48 either by offline or online mood. (MOOCs) with due permission. In this case, the students get a second Major (or double Major) in that subject, only if the student earns the first Major.



Degree in discipline

FYUGP offers Bachelor's Degrees in a Discipline across a range of subjects, including vocational programmes.

Bachelor of Vocation (B.Voc.)

The college offers Information Technology (IT) as a vocational subject, leading to the award of a Bachelor's Degree in Discipline (Vocation). Admission to this programme is open to students who have pursued vocational courses at the Higher Secondary level.

This programme follows the FYUGP framework, comprising core courses with a minimum of 84 credits along with 36 credits of common courses over a three-year duration. It does not include Major or Minor options; instead, students undertake a set of pre-defined courses specifically designed for the chosen discipline. UG WITH HONOURS : One Major-One Minor Programme

The credit allocation for each course under one Major- one Minor programme is as follows:

Major: 4 credits; Minor: 4 credits; Skill Enhancement Course (SEC): 3 credits; Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): 4 credits; Multidisciplinary Course (MDC): 3 credits; Value-Added Course (VAC): 2 credits.

- MAJOR CHANGE to be allowed after the 2nd semester, provided the departments have vacant major seats. Changed major to be started from the Day-1 of Third semester.
- Students exiting the programme after 2nd or 4th semester will be awarded UG Certificate/Diploma in the relevant Discipline/Subject provided they secure additional 4 credit in skill based vocational courses offered during first year or second year summer term.
- For UG (Honours with Research), a student has to carry out 12 credit research project/dissertation in the 4th Year.
- Summer Break in between 4th and 5th semester to be utilized for Internship, credit of which will be added to 5th semester.
- Those who miss the internship in 4th- 5th semester Summer Break, shall do the internship after the 6th Semester (during 6th semester Summer Break). In such cases, the 5th semester result shall not be COMPLETE.
- SEC-1 and 2 should be major oriented to supplement the Major.
- #SEEC-3 is open SEC. Any skill that the students require to be skillful in their professional / established life. Students may choose any one from the available Skill courses in the college for that semester.
- AEC- 1 is (Languages/Alt. English) and AEC-2 is English Communication.

UG WITHOUT HONOURS : Two Minors Programme

The credit allocation for each course under two minors programme is as follows:
 Minor 1: 4 credits; Minor 2: 4 credits; Skill Enhancement Course (SEC): 3 credits;
 Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): 4 credits; Multidisciplinary Course (MDC): 3 credits;
 Value-Added Course (VAC): 2 credits.

2. One can change their major subject at the beginning of Third semester. Even the students studying without major can select a subject as Major course in theThird semester. (Condition of seat capacity is applied) depending on MARKS OBTAINED IN 1ST AND 2ND SEM.
3. Notably, as the subjects Education and Geography have practical, so one can opt either one.
4. Students can also take any course of their choice (under free credits category) in SWAYAM/MOOCs platform

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Admission to BA course is open to the applicants who have passed the Higher Secondary examination in Arts under AHSEC or any other equivalent examination recognized by Gauhati University.

- The dates of admission to various courses will be notified in the college notice board and website.
- Admission to the college is made strictly in order of merit and government laid rules of reservation.

STEPS FOR ADMISSION

Step 1

- One must have to register in Digilocker (Ministry of Education, Government of India). For Digilocker, students must have AADHAR card.
- He/She must have Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) account. ABC is a virtual academic mechanism to facilitate the academic mobility of students between Educational institutions across the country. All students must obtain ABC ID through Digilocker platform before admission.

Step 2

A student must get ABC ID first and then go for online admission through college website www.kampurcollege.ac.in

- A student can go for online form fill up through Samarth Portal (kampurcollege.ac.in).
- Students need to submit the hardcopy of form as well as photocopy of other documents i.e. HSLC Admit, HS Mark sheet, HS Certificate, Caste Certificate, Income Certificate etc.
- After selection of candidates, student can deposit their fee or opt for Free Waiver Scheme.

Step 3

- After admission in the College, one must register under Gauhati University through Digilocker /ABC account ID.
- Thereafter he/she should choose their papers/ options.
- There will be a window of short duration to correct/confirm the programme/ papers.
- No one can change their papers at the mid of the semester.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Classes for newly admitted students of BA 1st semester for the session 2026-27 will start according to the latest Academic Calendar of Gauhati University. The college class hours are from 9.15 am to 4.15pm.

A. RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE COLLEGE

(i) College Rule and Discipline

The college places strong emphasis on discipline and character building as essential components of holistic education. Students are expected to uphold a high standard of conduct both within and outside the campus and to adhere strictly to the rules and regulations prescribed by the college authorities.

Any violation of these norms may invite disciplinary action, including withdrawal of scholarships or, in serious cases, expulsion from the institution. In all such matters, the decision of the Principal shall be final and binding.

- ✳ The College campus is under CCTV Surveillance.
- ✳ The college premises is a NO SMOKING ZONE. Smoking and any other kind of intoxicants including panmasala, gutkha and spitting in the classrooms are strictly prohibited.
- ✳ Gossiping and loitering either in the verandahs or in the class rooms are strictly prohibited when classes or examinations are going on.
- ✳ Damage of any college property will lead to severe punishment.
- ✳ Irregularities, misbehaviour, violence of any kind and disobedience towards the teachers or authority by any students are punishable.

(ii) Undertaking by the Parent/Guardian

The parent/ guardian of the student will have to give an undertaking in the prescribed format the time of submission of admission form in the college to the effect that his/her ward will maintain discipline and decorum of the college. In this form itself the parent/guardian will also have to give an undertaking mentioning their annual income.

(iii) Students' Class Attendance

The college takes students' class attendance into account for the purpose of allowing students for appearing in the Semester system, receiving academic awards and scholarships, participating in the students' union election etc. The college has the following rules in this regard,

20% of the marks allotted for Internal Assessment will be awarded to the students based on class attendance. If the total marks for Internal Assessment is 20, then 4 marks will be awarded to the students based on class attendance. The following criteria will be adopted for awarding marks under this category:

- A) Class attendance from 76% to 80% 1 mark
- B) Class attendance from 81% to 85% 2 marks
- C) Class attendance from 86% to 90% 3 marks
- D) Class attendance from 91% and above 4 marks

- A student whose attendance is more than 65% and less than 75% will have to pay non-collegiate fees to appear in any final examination conducted by GU.
- A student whose attendance is found to be less than 65% will be considered as Dis-collegiate and such student will be debarred from appearing in any final examination conducted by GU.
- Continued absence of 25 days in class is enough to prohibit the concerned students from attending classes.
- Scholarship holders with less than 75% of attendance will have to return the entire amount to the concerned authority.
- Students who remain absent to represent college in NCC, NSS and extracurricular activities in University/State/National/International level meets will have to compensate his/her loss through extra classes and Sessional Examination with the consent of the respective teachers.

(iv) Library Rules

- Keep silence inside the library.
- Bringing the library card is must to the user for availing the library facilities with proper uniform. once library card is not transferrable to the other user.
- Books are issued for 10 days only to students. re-issue of a book is provided only once to the students on request for the same period.
- Borrowers are asked to properly check the books before issuing. for any kind of damage, deface or mutilation of books will not be accepted at the time of submission. in that case users need to replace the book with a new copy or to pay three times of the cost of the book.
- After due date a fine of Rs. 1/- for per extra day is charged to the users for the borrowed documents.
- The borrowed documents can be returned on or before the due date on all working days.
- For any loss of documents students need to replace the book with a new copy or to pay three times higher the cost of the books.
- Personal books are not allowed to use inside the library.
- Do not misplace the books while searching and selecting in the shelves.
- Don't write or underline in the pages of the library books.
- Students are asked to return all the issued books before the semester examination. the signature from the authority on the admit cards are only provided after getting the library clearance.

(v) College Uniform

College Uniform is compulsory for all students. No student is permitted to wear any dress other than the college uniform in the college premises.

Boys : **White Shirt, Black Coloured Trouser**

Girls : **Muga or Muga Coloured Mekhela, White Chaddar with Blue Border and Blue Blouse/White Coloured Salwar Kamij with Blue Coloured Churni. Leggings Are Strictly Prohibited.**

Sweater : **In Winter, Black Sweater for Boys and Black Cardigan For Girls.**

COLLEGE UNIFORM IS COMPULSORY FOR ALL STUDENTS AND NO OTHER DRESS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE COLLEGE PREMISES.

(vi) Identity Card

The college authority issues an identity card at the time of admission to every student. This card is non-transferable. It contains vital information about the holder viz, name, semester, class, roll no and a passport size photograph duly attested and signed by the principal. It is mandatory for a student to keep the identity card during his/her college hours.

(vii) Teacher-Guardian meet

The teacher guardian meetings are held regularly in the college keeping in view the academic schedule.

B. FACILITIES PROVIDED IN THE COLLEGE

(i) College library and reading room

The college has a well-organized library processing for automation with an integrated Library Management Software accommodated with a good stock of text books, reference books and other recreational books. A large number of journals, magazines and periodicals including Newspapers are also stocked in the library with a spacious reading room for creating reading environment for the students. After admission students are provided with library cards to issue books. Students are issued two books for pass course and four books for honours courses. Borrowers must return the books within ten days from the date of issue of the books. An overdue of charge of Rs 1/- per book per day, will be levied if the book is not returned on or before the due date. However, there is provision of re-issue and reservation of books. A borrower will be responsible for the loss or damage of any book borrowed from the college library. Students are asked to submit all the issued books before their final examinations for getting clearance from the library for the issue of admit cards.

(ii) Departmental Library

Each department of Kampur College has a departmental library with the facility of providing books to the interested students. These libraries have journals, reference books etc. which is of great help particularly to the students opting for Major/Honours.

(iii) Photocopy and print out

The college offers photocopying and printing services at nominal rates for the convenience of students and staff.

(iv) Digital Classroom

The college is equipped with digital classrooms featuring installed digital boards, facilitating interactive and technology-enabled teaching and learning

(v) Internet facility

Free internet access is available across the college campus, promoting digital literacy and supporting students in their academic and technological advancement.

(vi) Internet browsing point

The college provides internet browsing facilities for both students and faculty, enabling access to digital resources and supporting academic and research activities. These facilities ensure a conducive environment for e-learning, online research, and effective use of information and communication technology.



(vii) Mentor and Mentee System

The college has an established student mentoring system aimed at fostering meaningful interaction between faculty members and students. All teachers actively participate in this initiative, with each mentor assigned a group of students. A comprehensive record of mentees is maintained by every mentor, including details such as name, class, section, roll number, contact information, and email ID.

Mentors provide both academic guidance and personal counselling, supporting students in their educational journey as well as in addressing individual concerns. Students are encouraged to approach their mentors for assistance, advice, and career counselling. This system plays a vital role in enhancing students' confidence, capabilities, and overall development. The mentor-mentee list for the current session will be published in due course.

(viii) Scholarship

1. UGC Scholarship : (a) For general category-APL/BPL certificate has to be produced. (b) For OBC/MOBC (Non-Creamy Layer)/SC/ST category- Caste certificate has to be produced.

2. Minority Scholarship : (a) Annual income certificate from the DDOs for the students whose father/mother is in service

(b) Annual income certificate from the Circle Officer/ Mouzadar for the students whose father/mother is not in service.

3. General Scholarship : Students may claim national scholarship, state merit scholarship ST/SC/OBC/Minority scholarship according to their choice and eligibility subject to govt rule 3 of 7 provision is there for cash award for students who are differently abled.

4. Ishan-Uday : the Ishan- Uday scheme sponsored by UGC has been availed by our first year undergraduate students, the students whose family income does not exceed Rs.4.5 lakh per annum are eligible to apply for this scholarship.

✳ The above scholarships are granted by the Government for which application forms of eligible students are forwarded to the respective authorities for consideration



(ix) Girls' and Boys' Common room

B. FEE WAIVER SCHEME

In continuation of **FEE WAIVER SCHEME** under Pragyan Bharti for free admission into Degree Course for the Academic Session 2026-27 a student whose parental income is below Rs. 2 Lakh could avail the scheme. However, its applicability will be based on :

- ✳ **Proof of Income Certificate issued by the Circle Officer (Competent revenue official) only.**
- ✳ **Income Certificate issued by Mouzadar/Head of the Institution last attended will not be applicable.**
- ✳ **Ration Card issued by the Government**

RULES AND REGULATIONS ON ANTI-RAGGING :

1. Aim :

To root out ragging in all its forms from the institution, stringent anti-ragging measures and provisions for strict punishments to defaulters.

Terms of Reference :

- (a) Supreme Court Orders
- (b) UGC Draft Regulations and Guidelines

2. What constitutes Ragging :

- (a) Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student.
- (b) Indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological or physical harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student.
- (c) Asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.
- (d) Teasing, embarrassing, humiliating, assaulting or using criminal force or criminal intimidation, wrongful restraining or confining or causing grievous hurt, kidnapping, extortion or molesting or committing unnatural offences or causing death or abetting suicide, use of criminal force, criminal trespass and intimidation.



3. Prohibition of Ragging :

- (a) Ragging within the institutions/departments is strictly prohibited.
- (b) Ragging in any form is prohibited also in the private lodges/buildings where these college students are staying.
- (c) No person including students/staff/faculty shall participate or abet or propagate ragging in any form. No person shall practise ragging in any form, within or outside the premises of the college. Any person who contravenes the provision listed above shall, on conviction, be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to 3 years or with fine which may extend to fifty thousand rupees or with both.

4. Roles and Responsibilities :

Any incidence of matters related to ragging may immediately report it to the anti-ragging squad, the principal or the "Officer-in-Charge. The identity of the complainant will be kept confidential. In all cases a First Information Report (FIR) will be filed without exception by the college authorities with the local Police authority. Whenever any student or, as the case may be, the parents or guardian or a teacher, the non-teaching staff or an Officer-in-Charge makes a complaint, in writing, of ragging to the principal, the principal shall, without prejudice to the foregoing provisions, enquire into it and, if, prima facie, it is found true, suspend the student found guilty.

5. Formation of Committee :

To assist authorities in curbing the menace of ragging, an anti-ragging squad has been formed in the college consisting of the following members-
